2005 – fun, games and growth

Another busy year is drawing to a close for the Darebin Parklands Association. And what a year it's been. This year we expanded our program of community events, holding our first annual Darebin Parklands Picnic Races, where we lobbed gumboots and eggs and crowned our inaugural King and Queen of the Mountain. With 300 members, the DPA is now one of Australia's biggest community environmental groups.

We made huge progress on one of the parklands' longest running projects, the restoration of Hidden Valley. Our partnership with Westpac Bank and LandCare, and the assistance of rangers and DPA members, has seen new pathways built and hundreds of trees, shrubs and grasses planted. We also developed our new website www.dpa.org.au, installed water pollution hotline signs and grew hundreds of plants in our nursery. As this is the last newsletter of the year I'd like to thank everyone who has helped us in 2005: the rangers; the DPA committee, and in particular Anthony Jones who has done a magnificent job building our website: and of course our members, whose donations of time and money make all of our achievements possible. We are having a busy time at present with many schools booking in due to the improving weather.

Ivanhoe Primary School received a grant for \$2000 to revegetate a local park and they selected Darebin Parklands. Preps, grade ones and twos are working along the creek below McDonald Avenue on the Northcote floodplain. The children have planted riparian trees, shrubs and grasses.

It's a great project although a little late in the year to plant, but as it's along the creek we should be able to maintain them easily enough. The kids are taking ownership of their plants. They have written their names on each plant and had return visits to water them.

The bonfire night of 14 October went well and once again we were blessed with a perfect night for it. Our "Survivor theme" seemed to be popular although seeing children using our theme lights as Olympic torches was interesting; not to mention them trying to cook marshmallows on them. We live and learn.

The City of Darebin and Darebin Creek Management Committee are hosting movies in the park over summer with the first movie date set on Saturday 11 February.

We will have Cuban music beforehand and a family movie starting after dusk. With the DPA's help Rhys and I will be running a refreshment and food stall on the night. The movie is free to the public but it costs \$1000 to host. This time Darebin Council is footing the bill, but in future we will have to. I apologise for length of the grass around the park – both councils are struggling to keep up the required slashing due to the high growth rates we're seeing this year. We will do our best to keep the grass down and the weeds under control in the coming weeks. Ironically the best days for weed control works are fine with no wind – also the most popular time for visitors. This means spraying must be done very early in the morning.

I would like to thank the DPA committee members who have been so helpful over the past few months, Graeme Martin, Ingrid Svendsen, Sue Course and Sue Kelly and also Barry Arnstein.

Park funding an election issue

As we all know, the Darebin Parklands is a vital community resource for passive recreation, enjoyed by hundreds of local residents daily.

Rangers employed by the Darebin Creek Management Committee (DCMC), which is partly funded by Banyule Council, are responsible for the day to day management of the park.

The DPA is concerned that Banyule Council funding for the DCMC to support the operation of the Darebin Parklands has been declining in real value over the last few years.

As a result, the parkland division is running at a loss – \$21,000 last year. This shortfall is significantly impacting on the operations of the parklands.

To bring this serious issue to the attention of the council, the DPA invited candidates in the forthcoming council election to a tour of the parklands on Saturday 5 November. We were impressed by the turn-out of eight candidates, including five who are contesting Griffin Ward, which borders the park. The sitting and would-be councillors were shown around by ranger Peter Wiltshire and DPA representatives.

The candidates who came were: Jenny Mulholland, Dayananda Shetty, Peter Hammond, Spiros Papadopoulos and Michel Foster (Griffin Ward); Anthony Carbines, Gary Schorel-Hlavka (Olympia Ward); Ginny Verberne (Grimshaw Ward).

We have also invited candidates for Griffin Ward to make a public statement of their commitment to restore adequate funds to the DCMC to manage the park. The DPA will not support any particular candidate but for the information of our members we have posted the statements received so far on our new, improved website at <u>www.dpa.org.au</u>. We will also note those candidates who have not responded.

After the elections, we will retain the statement from the successful candidate on our website as a record of what we hope will be their commitment to help restore equitable funding to Darebin Parklands.

Seeds and weeds

Want to help grow plants for the park? Snakes: be alert, not alarmed

Tiger snakes live along most local waterways, including the Darebin Creek. They are pale grey to brown with bands on top that can be olive green or reddish brown to black.

While tiger snakes are venomous there is no need for panic. No-one in recent memory has been bitten in the parklands, because snakes are generally shy unless provoked. Snakes are protected wildlife, so it's illegal to kill or relocate them without a permit. If you see a snake, keep your eye on it while calmly moving away. Also remember to:

- Be alert for basking snakes, even on warm winter days;
- Wear solid shoes and protective clothing when snakes may be about;
- Never reach into hollow logs or long grass without checking first;
- Check the other side before stepping over logs or rocks;
- Stop your dog from running through long grass where snakes could live.

If you live near the park, you can minimise the chances of a snake visit by keeping grass short, clearing away rubbish and other potential hiding places and controlling food sources, such as rats and mice.
